TRIBAL GAMING AND THE STATES:

WHERE SHOULD THE MONEY GO?

Earlier this year, the Rincon Band of Luiseno Indians, located in CA, won a landmark Supreme Court case against former CA Governor Schwarzenegger. Specifically, the case found that the former Governor was negotiating for an illegal tax on the tribe. The decision will have substantial effects nationwide on how states negotiate future compacts and what states can legally ask tribes to pay for. Most recently, Rincon negotiated a deal with San Diego County that will divert funds from CA state coffers but bring millions directly to county infrastructure projects and public safety.

Questions remain unanswered: Do states have the authority to tax tribal gaming proceeds? Where should tribal gaming moneys go—to mitigate local impacts or do states have the right to share in the profits when giving tribes exclusive gambling rights?

EVER-EXPANDING GAMING:

SHORT-TERM REWARDS V. LONG-TERM IMPACTS?

More and more, states are looking to gaming to fill in gaps in their budgets. CA, FL, IL, IA, KY, ME, MA, MN, MO, NJ, and OH are joining PA, NY, and MI and others in expanding gaming.

Will the initial cash flow be outweighed in the long run by inadvertent consequences? Should states conduct objective studies of social and economic impacts prior to taking on new gaming venues? How can states ramp up their regulations to match their new gaming initiatives? Are independent gambling commissions like those in Nevada and New Jersey necessary?

INTERNET GAMING LEGISLATION:

IS DOING NOTHING A WORSE CASE SCENARIO?

Not much has happened federally since 2006 passage of the Unlawful Internet Gaming Enforcement Act (UIGEA)—and its highly contested ban and much-questioned enforcement—though not for lack of trying. States are now moving toward intrastate internet gaming.

Since so many Americans are playing Internet poker and forms of Internet wagering, is doing nothing at all worse than actively addressing the issue? How can states protect US bettors from bad players? Address underage and problem gambling? Is there a federal fix in sight?
